Let your speech always be gracious, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how you ought to answer everyone. (Colossians 4:6)

The season of Lent begins on Wednesday, March 1. We call that day Ash Wednesday (see page 2 for evening service details) because there is a long tradition of Christians marking their foreheads with ashes to begin a time, personally and as a community, to turn toward God's tenaciously faithful love. Then in the light of God's grace and mercy we can find the courage to look honestly at who we are and open ourselves to God's healing. I hope that sounds a lot different to you than "giving up things" for Lent in order to be a good Christian. The original point of "giving up" was to clear our lives of the clutter that keeps us from listening and responding to God. If forgoing chocolate or meat helps you do that, then by all means go ahead. I know in my own life that I need to clear away some of my busyness and my distractions in order to be still and listen, listen, listen for what God is saying.

One of the spiritual growth opportunities comes each week—reading the Bible. This can be as simple as a few minutes of reading followed by a few minutes of silent reflection. The Scripture texts from your worship bulletin are a good place to begin. You are invited to revisit the readings after Sunday--at home or during lunch at your desk. And you can join us each Wednesday morning (March 1 through April 12) in the sanctuary at 7 am for a service of morning prayer and communion. We will have you on your way by 7:40 so that you can get to other responsibilities. We also have an ongoing Bible group those same Wednesdays at 9 am.

Lent lasts for 40 days and the six Sundays between Ash Wednesday and Easter don't count toward the 40. Even in a time when we remember how Jesus set his face toward Jerusalem to die, the Sundays are always a celebration of resurrection day.

There are books I love to read again and family stories I hear and tell over and over. The story of Jesus' last days is like that. We tell it to our children and hear anew for ourselves—how much God loves us in Jesus Christ. We listen to our Lord's teachings and his invitation to live another way, knowing that he gave his life for our sake. It's worth the time to explore this story as a church and to choose some time for ourselves in March and April to reflect on its meaning for each of us. Lent is a journey of faith—let's walk together.

Grace and peace are yours in Christ Jesus.

STEWARDSHIP



This month, we are concentrating on Principle #9 of the "10 Financial Principles that are Biblical. Principle # 9 talks about working hard. Our work is a gift from God and we must glorify God.

There is a difference between working hard and being a "workaholic" and Principle #9 touches upon that. We must remember for whom we work and in doing so, we are reminded of that balance between work and everything else that we do.

10 Financial Principles that are Biblical

Who's My Real Boss?

The Scripture spells it out: *"Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all of your might."*

Ecclesiastes 9:10. The Lord expects us to do the best we possibly can. There is value in work.

Principle #9 Work Hard

Our real boss is the Lord, and He is pleased with hard work in pursuit of excellence. Our work should never be at a level that people equate with mediocrity. Our work is a reflection of our spiritual relationship with our Lord.

This does not mean that we have to be perfect and never make mistakes in our work. The Lord expects us to do the best we can using the gifts, skills and abilities He has uniquely given us.

Our work is a gift. It is designed to develop character. A job is not just a means to earn money, it is also intended to produce godly character in the life of the worker... whether we are doctors, homemakers, secretaries, salespeople, managers or blue-collar workers.

Yet, as important as working hard and diligently at what we do is, there also needs to be balance. Some people work so much that they neglect the other aspects of their lives. If our jobs demand so much of our time and energy that we neglect our relationship with Christ and/or our family, then we are working too hard. We are forgetting the importance of balance in our lives.

"Workaholics" must take precautions to guard against sacrificing what's really important. The gift of work is just one of many gifts which God has given us!

The most important question we need to ask everyday as we begin our work is: For whom do I work? The answer is: I work for Christ.

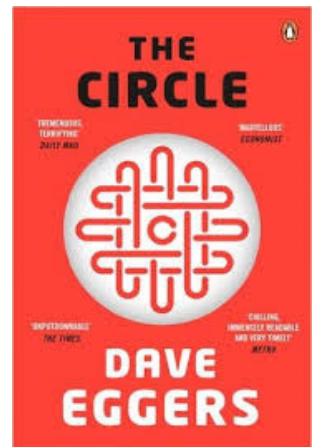

"If the Church were your home"

Youth Participants: for chaperones, driving, food prep, etc.

Think what would happen if every member gave just three hours a week - consistently in some way. How much we all would profit, how effective would our ministry be!
